


Study Design

Participants

- 83 parent-teen dyads
- Blacksburg, Roanoke, VA
- Permit to licensure +12 months

Method

- Continuous in-vehicle recording
 - 6 cameras → video was coded
 - Audio → coding in progress
 - GPS (location and speed)
 - Accelerometers (G-forces)
- Video Sampling
 - Trip files: driver, supervisor, conditions
 - First, Middle and Last 10 hours



Video Sampling

 Randomly sampled 30-sec segments from each 5-min period of driving


Coded for:

- Driving Conditions
- Driving Instruction
- Driving Errors
- Secondary Task Engagement



Conversations – First 10 hours

- In 87% of clips there was conversation present
- 69% of conversations parents dominated



Driving-related conversation

Defining Driving Instruction

Real time

 Related to the present time or immediate future related to events that are occurring during the drive


Higher order

- Conveys general principles of driving
- May result from a specific event, but generalizes to other situations

Driving Instruction

Topics	Real Time	Higher Order
Navigation	"You're going to make a left turn at the next traffic light."	"I like to think about the route I'm going to take before I leave home"
Hazard Detection	"You've got a car pulling out of a drive way up ahead."	"You've got to adjust to the road situation. If it rains, you've got to adjust to that."
Vehicle Handling	"Slow down. Slow way down. He's pulling out."	"Try leaving a few car spaces between yourself and the other vehicle."
Comment on Driving	"You took that corner too fast."	"When turning, be sure you are over in the far lane so no car pulls around you"
Asks Question About Driving	"What are you going to do you when that bus stops ahead of you?"	"How often should you be checking your rear view mirror?"
Rules of the Road	"What does this sign mean?"	"Always follow the speed limit".


Topics of Driving Instruction



Driving Errors


Definitions	Example	
Distraction	Inattention, distraction or eyes removed from roadway	
Failure to Stop	Failure to yield or stop	
Hazard Detection	Failure to detect a hazard	
Speed Management	Driving too slow or too fast for current conditions, hard breaking	
Vehicle Management	Crossing lines, driving the wrong way, overcorrecting, following too closely or improper vehicle operation	
Other	Other error types
