Mobility in the U.S.

- America is a suburban nation.
- > 88 percent of all trips made by older adults are as drivers or passengers in their personal vehicles.
- Eight in ten boomers say they want to live where they are as long as possible.





Complete Streets

- Streets designed for the safety and comfort of all road users, regardless of age and ability.
- > Three principles of Complete Streets:
 - Slow Down
 - Make It Easy
 - Enjoy the View





First Principle: Slow Down

- Reduce vehicle speeds in areas where vehicles and pedestrians interact and where older drivers and pedestrians need more time to make decisions and execute changes.
- Examples: Roundabouts, traffic calming measures







Second Principle: Make It Easy

- Make the physical layout of transportation systems easy to navigate for all road users.
- > Example: Street networks designed for proximity



Third Principle: Enjoy the View

- Make it easy for older drivers and pedestrians to notice, read, understand, and respond to visual cues and information.
- Example: Large-sized pedestrian countdown signals; crosswalks painted with zebra stripes







Automobile Technology

- New research from The Hartford and MIT AgeLab reveals top technologies for older drivers.
 - Smart headlights
 - Emergency response systems
 - Blind spot warning systems
 - Assistive parking systems
 - Lane departure warning





Older Driver Safety

- Drivers 65+ are the fastest growing age group on the road today.
- The greatest risk for safe driving among older
 Americans comes from healthrelated conditions.

- Classroom course launched in 1979
- > Over 14 million participants
- Classroom setting or online
- English or Spanish







AARP Driver Safety Course Details

Key Topics Include:

- The course lasts four, six, or eight hours depending on individual state requirements
- Although designed for drivers 50 and older, the course is open to all licensed drivers
- 100% facilitated by AARPtrained volunteers



*Legislation has been enacted in 36 states and DC mandating multi-year discounts on insurance premiums for completing the course. Additionally, many insurers offer voluntary discounts in other select states.



Impact on Drivers



97% changed at least one driving behavior

Most common behaviors changed:



Additionally:

> 89% report they are likely to recommend the course to family and friends

83% report they are likely to take the course again

 Self-policing behaviors:
7% more limit night driving (to 21%)
8% more limit bad weather driving (to 24%)

We Need to Talk

- Warning signs:
 - Almost crashing, with frequent "close calls"



- Finding dents and scrapes on the car, fences, mailboxes, etc.
- Having trouble seeing or following signals, road signs, and pavement markings.
- Misjudging gaps in traffic at intersections and on highway entrance and exit ramps
- Having a hard time turning around to check mirrors or blind spots
- Receiving multiple traffic tickets or "warnings" from law enforcement officers

CarFit

- A free, in-person educational program
- Sponsored by AARP, AAA, and the American Occupational Therapy Association
- Offers older adults the opportunity to check how well their personal vehicles "fit" them.







CarFit

- Ways technicians help ensure that the driver is properly fitted include:
 - A clear line of sight over the steering wheel.
 - Plenty of room between the center of your chest and the driver side airbag (center of steering wheel).
 - Properly adjusted head restraints.
 - Easy access to gas and brake pedals.
 - Properly positioned side and rearview mirrors.
